

# SMITHSONIAN INSTITUTION ANNOUNCES NEW BUILDING

The Smithsonian Institution, Washington, D. C., has released architectural plans for its new Museum of History and Technology building. The announcement was made by Leonard Carmichael, secretary of the institution, and Senator Clinton P. Anderson of New Mexico, chairman of the Joint Congressional Committee on Construction for the building. The structure will occupy a site bounded by Constitution Avenue, Madison Drive (in the Mall), and 12th and 14th Streets, N. W. It is contemporary in design, and also harmonizes in spirit with existing monumental buildings on the Mall and Constitution Avenue. The bays of the exterior of the new structure will relate in scale to the mass of surrounding buildings. Windows in the reveals of the bays are to provide some daylight, and the large enclosed spaces will be artificially lighted, with exhibits lighted to a higher bright-

The institution's extensive technological collections, illustrating the history and development of science and engineering, will be installed on the first floor at the Constitution Avenue level. The collections on civil

and military history and growth of the United States will occupy galleries on floors above. Spaces for workrooms, laboratories, and study collections are provided above the exhibition floors, and storages for heavy objects will be in the basement with the service areas.

The building was designed by the architectural firm of McKim, Mead and White, of New York City. It has been approved by the Special Joint Committee of the Senate and House of Representatives, the Regents of the Smithsonian Institution, National Commission of Fine Arts. National Capital Planning Commission, and General Services Administration. Several years of work have been given to matters of space organization. Detailed drawings are now being prepared, and construction is expected to start early this summer. Frank A. Taylor is assistant director of the United States National Museum, Smithsonian Institution, in charge of planning the new museum.

The Uncle Remus Museum Association, George M. Scheer, Eatonton, Ga., secretary, is developing a museum on the life of Joel Chandler Harris, author of the Uncle Remus stories.
